Singing in the Papal Choir during the 16th century...

Choir "boys" even got into trouble then!



"Juan Sánchez, first admitted in June, 1529, was the most flamboyant member of the generally hot-tempered Spanish section of the choir.

In January, 1540, not wishing to sing the part allotted him by the director, he hit him "in the presence of the Sacrament," thus creating a "very great scandal." He was imprisoned, but the Spaniards in the choir banded together and sent Ordoñez to plead with the Pope, who indulgently reinstated him with only the proviso that Sánchez lose senior status in the choir and return in the rank of a beginner.

[...] Even after reinstatement, however, Sánchez continued to behave badly—often pretending to be sick when he wanted a day off, and quarreling with other choir members. Like Sánchez and Ordoñez, Nuñez was not above pretending to be sick when it suited his convenience to work in his garden."




Meet St. Corona, patroness of epidemics.

Would you believe the patron saint of resistance to epidemics is ... St Corona!

She witnessed the martyrdom of St Victor, a Roman soldier who was executed by his brothers-in-arms for his Christian faith about 1800 years ago.

While Victor was being tortured and disfigured, the brave 16-year-old Corona cried out comforting words and encouragement as Victor held fast to his faith and gave up his life for the Lord. Victor's persecutors soon turned on Corona and she too was martyred.

Aachen Cathedral in Germany has relics of St Corona preserved in a small but elaborate gold, bronze and ivory shrine and were planning to display the shrine in the coming European summer as part of an exhibition on gold craftsmanship. They now expect a great deal of interest, once the reliquary is finally able to go on display!




