It is an unusual time of the year in some ways – the end of the calendar year and rehearsals but start of the liturgical year. The period of Advent is (or used to be), a time for reflection although this is difficult in our secular society and all the commercialism of Christmas. Society as a whole seems unable to cope with more sombre periods and is reluctant to be solemn – everyone has to be happy all the time!



We were then welcomed by Mayor Jennifer Anderson, who expressed her interest in TCS and had personally suggested that we be invited to provide the entertainment for the evening.








Then we headed to All Saints' Anglican Church, Ainslie to be greeted with a Latin sign in the bell tower – in translation: 'Sleep through this, heathens!'

This building was originally Cemetery Station No.1 on the Rookwood Cemetery railway line. It is interesting to note that this building was dismantled and moved in Canberra in 1958.



The building is really from all over, as one of the stain-glass windows was part of a church in Gloucestershire, England which was bombed in World War 2. The bell was originally on a shay locomotive owned by the Commonwealth Oil Corporation. It was dismantled in 1925 and presented to the church by the Australian Railway Historical Society in 1958. On June 1 1958, a stone was set on the church by the High Commissioner for the United Kingdom, Lord Carrington to mark the blessing of the church.



TCS was blessed to sing an evensong in such an historically interesting church!

Music Therapy

Thanks to the website (the old one), I found TCS. An instinct sent me back to singing and thankfully I listened and acted on it.



I have experienced moments of pure joy while singing and a general feeling of well-being afterwards. I go home and am wide awake some hours after practice with no hint of tiredness. I wondered what was behind it and being research-minded started to look for evidence and information to support the results I was seeing. By the way this is not the way to conduct research — the generally accepted methodology is that you commence with a hypothesis and then proceed to disprove (or prove) the hypothesis.

This is a small section of what I discovered: Little has been done recently on the science side of 'music as therapy'. It appears it was a prevalent theory around 10 years ago and then fell into oblivion due to lack of compelling evidence. It has recently experienced a resurgence of interest and I managed to find one randomised, controlled, clinical trial that demonstrates a positive effect on people of working age, diagnosed with clinical depression (under International Classification of Disease criteria - ICD10). The trial compared standard of care therapy (psychotherapy, antidepressants in conjunction with psychiatric counselling and support) with standard of care plus music therapy and found that music therapy was a valuable addition to standard of care, although due to the small numbers involved in the trial (n=79)' the effects did not reach statistical clinical significance. (*British Journal of Psychiatry* 2011, 199:132-139)

Several studies reported at the annual conference of the American Society for Neuroscience in 2013 confirm the beneficial effects of music and identify these benefits as anything from improving the ability of the nervous system to integrate input from all senses to generating new processes in the brain affecting cognition, creativity and learning (Megan Brooks, *www.medscape.com* November 18th 2013).

Most of these studies focus on playing an instrument ie a non-verbal process and also only look at small numbers. As we know, what appears to be an effect in small populations needs to be tested and validated in larger populations, so there is still much work to be done to clearly demonstrate that the effects in small populations can be reproduced in large populations.

Until then, I know my sense of well-being is increased through belonging to The Cathedral Singers and integrating my voice with others as a group performance. Thank you, TCS.

From the tone of the discussion overheard by this humble author I believe we are safe in concluding that a fair number waited in hope that the words would be available. Not ranking among them however was our long suffering director, who had been commenting since Wednesday's rehearsal that the proper place for a TCS chorister's attention is surely his own person, and certainly upon reflection of that fact we would all have to agree. Certainly in this instance, when his person had been so expertly beautified it seemed a shame for us to be casting our attentions elsewhere.

Before long it was time to robe up in some of the most luxurious robing areas our fine choir is likely to see. What a nice change, not to be worried about knocking over vases and candlesticks as we donned our cassocks. A quick run through of 'Abide with Me', followed by some pleased murmurs from the Foxtel staff, and we were ready to stand by outside the studio itself, before being waved in by our commanding but encouraging floor manager.



Being properly inside the studio generated some goofy smiles and childlike nervousness among us, which was a fitting mood for our first number, Away in a Manger. This we sang a capella, easily completing a dry run and a couple of takes. The spirit of Christmas began to descend upon the studio as our beautiful sopranos sang the last verse with restraint and dignity. Well done, ladies!

Mention must be made of the morning's back row, the ranks of which were swelled by some very fine reinforcements. The lads outdid themselves and with no music, had nowhere to look but at the autocue. As luck would have it, standing directly in front was none other than our esteemed leader. We all were a part of the cosmic event occurring, as the director and the basses remained in constant and unhampered communication. Lightning may well have been forking above the building as the fabric of the universe was re-woven, at this time. We would not have known, though, as the studio

maintains an impressive standard of sound and light proofing.

Onto 'Hark! The Herald Angels Sing' we went, at which point the sublime sounds of Melissa Abraham's trumpet joined the fray, accompanied by the reassuring and exuberant playing of our keyboardist for the day, busting his chops on what we were told was an extremely high tech keyboard.

Christmas had well and truly arrived early but it was time for a more serious number, as we began work on Abide with Me. In a true show business moment, a cry of "Lose the tree!" rang out across the studio. It was duly rolled away behind a curtain, while our charming keyboardist posed and played for a band break. After the adjustments to the set, the choir resumed its place. Easily replacing the splendor of the tree was our radiant trumpeter Melissa, playing beautifully but with some magnitude into the bulletproof ear of first soprano Lynn Bock. Well done Lynn for going where no first soprano has gone before and holding your own line against another that is equally loud. Your alto sisters only a row back, were looking on with pride. 'Abide with Me' took a few takes but by the end we had come down from the joy of Christmas to a more fitting contemplative mood, and this meant we ended our recording session sounding very fine indeed.



This completed our work for the morning, and totally elated by these events we trod gingerly on sore feet back to the green room, where a home made morning tea was waiting for us, and of course, more coffee. Here we hobnobbed and soaked up the atmosphere of show business over some miniature boiled fruit cakes and hand made biscuits. Each of us was given a bon bon filled with chocolates by the Wesley Mission, surely too much on top of the opportunity to sing together at the studio. We left feeling very much like stars as we sauntered casually

out to the car park as if it was something we did every day. I think it was a truly exceptional experience for each one of us. It is always a great thing to

be a TCS chorister, but for one morning in November this year, it was also, briefly, a very glamorous thing!
