

From the Director

It only seems like yesterday that I was writing the last newsletter but it turns out it was July – how time flies! As you will see in the newsletter, TCS has been through a busy spell with many services, a recording session and also a weekend away. Much work for these things goes on behind the scenes and many thanks to the members of the committee who work tirelessly to ensure that things go as smoothly as possible. Most events require many emails and phone calls. One recent service from our weekend away required several emails to find out who to email!

One of the advantages of being a peripatetic choir is that we are used to many different formats of services and are adaptable. This was shown at the morning service in Goulburn where originally there was a baptism in the service. At the last moment, this was cancelled and we needed to sing a Kyrie. The "local" Kyrie was given to us two minutes before the service started but once we were in the choirstalls, the organist suggested that we sing the Darke in F Kyrie if we were happy to do so —we sang it even though we had never rehearsed it in that buildng!

This year we celebrate the 25^{th} year of TCS – so this is our Jubilee year. Life 25 years ago was very different. What else happened in 1990?

- Nelson Mandela was released from prison
- Margaret Thatcher resigned as Prime Minister of the UK

25th Anniversary of The Cathedral Singers – a thumbnail sketch.

During the latter part of 1989, BISHOP KEN SHORT, as Dean of St Andrew's Cathedral, invited MRS SHIRLEY MILLS to form a mixed choir which could deputise for the Cathedral Choir of men and boys. SHIRLEY was a teacher of singing and had conducted several singing groups. She accepted the challenge, in spite of having no music, no money, no robes and no singers. By October, The Cathedral Singers were ready to sing their first Sunday services. Membership grew fairly quickly, and after 2 months, with almost 30 voices, they were recording an Easter program, on location, for ABC television.

The first accompanist was CRAIG WHARTON, who then resigned to follow another profession, when ERIC PETERSON, the Cathedral's deputy organist, was appointed. Having been a chorister, he had a good knowledge of Cathedral music and the ability to play it, although he was only 17 years old.

The Singers were invited to sing at several churches in the metropolitan area – many with the name "St John's". They soon undertook tours, eg, to the Blue Mountains for weekends, to Bathurst, Canberra, Bowral, and established the annual Advent Carol Service at Leura, which remains as a "Blue Mountains event".

When Shirley retired, Eric was appointed as Musical Director. The Singers then visited Brisbane, and soon afterwards New Zealand – Christchurch, Wellington and Auckland. Later the "4Ws" trip went to Wagga Wagga, Wangaratta and Wodonga, as well as singing Christmas Carols in shopping centres and hotels. Guest conductors included MICHAEL DEASEY (St Andrew's), CHRISTOPHER DEARNLEY (St Paul's London) and Sheryl Southwood. GLENN McKENZIE was also very much part of TCS, including a time as Deputy Director.

When Eric resigned, Sydney organist and composer BRETT McKERN followed as Musical Director.. Under his direction, the Singers made two tours to England, 2008 and 2011, including singing in Westminster Abbey, Westminster Cathedral, St Paul's Cathedral London, York, Ely, Peterborough Cathedrals and others, plus Great St Mary's Parish Church, Cambridge and St John's College Chapel (there is yet another "St John's").

The fourth and current Director is JIM ABRAHAM, who came from England in 2001, having married an Australian girl, Melissa. He is now very much part of TCS and manages to fit us into his busy schedule.

To celebrate the 25th Anniversary, The Cathedral Singers, now one of the "choirs in residence" at St John's Gordon, are singing Evensong on Sunday 11 October 2015, at 4.00pm and would be pleased to see former members and families on this occasion.





Sandstone and Bluestone

The White, the Gold and the Grey: Variations on a Geological Theme.

Our first view of the city of Goulburn was from Rocky Hill, site of the Goulburn War Memorial. This iconic tower can be seen from the highway that now bypasses the city and is used in miniature to mark the entry to Goulburn from both Hume Highway exits. It was a dull and drizzly day when we arrived but the tower still provided a spectacular view over the Mulwaree Ponds and the cityscape beyond. St Saviour's Cathedral and St Peter and St Paul's Old Cathedral were clearly visible on either side of the yellowish stucco of the Post Office tower - the gold and the grey.



Both these churches dominate the cityscape with their towers and spires. Their interiors provided wonderful acoustics for The Cathedral Singers on Saturday evening and Sunday morning.




Goulburn War Memorial Tower

The White: The War Memorial, opened in 1924, commemorates those who served and died during the First World War. It is an imposing square tower constructed of concrete, motor and locally derived clean, white, fine-grained sandstone from Rocky Hill. Rocky Hill is part of a longer resistant ridge of this sandstone from the Cockbundoon Formation.

Jointing and fracturing in this rock provides the small-brick sized blocks from which the tower is built.

The Grey: St Peter and St Paul's is purportedly the only "bluestone" church in the southern hemisphere.

While the exterior walls are dominated by the distinctive grey-green dolerite (locally known as diorite porphyry), the colouring a feature of the dark greenish minerals in the rock, the contrasting golden sandstone used elsewhere in the construction and in the stone carvings is Wingello Stone from Marulan. After some consultations and further research with geological and topographic maps and the ever-present Google, it seems likely that the local quarry from which the dolerite is sourced is about 2km to the WNW of SPP on Range Road. An old quarry is clearly visible from the air and the geological map confirms that rock is the aptly-named massive, grey-green Bishopsthorpe Dolerite. This stone was also used to construct nearby Bishopsthorpe, the residence of the first Anglican Bishop of Goulburn, in 1870. Thus, the quarry was already well-developed when construction for the Catholic Cathedral of St Peter and St Paul began in 1871. It is interesting to note that the massive nature of the diorite and its hardness would have made it significantly more difficult to work that the sandstones used in some parts of the construction and almost exclusively at St Saviour's. This may account for the rougher form of the stone blocks in the Old Cathedral. A further point of interest is that the term "bluestone" is also used to describe the rocks of Stonehenge, also dolerite.

The Gold: St Saviour's Cathedral is a spectacular example of Edmund Blacket's ecclesiastical architecture with its exterior and interior walls of the warmly-cream Marulan Sandstone, interior load-bearing columns of dark golden Pyrmont Sandstone and facings and detail of luminous white Bundanoon Sandstone. Weathering has painted the exterior walls, tower and carvings a warm gold. The sandstone construction of this building has made it easier to produce the evenly shaped sandstone blocks from which it is made.
